Managing Director, Gallagher Bloodstock and Equine Insurance - Sophie Chambers

Bloodstock Insurance is a type of insurance policy specifically designed to owners breeders, and trainers of horses, particularly those with high value, such as racehorse or breeding stock.

It covers a range of risks including: theft, mortality, financial loss if a horse is unable to perform its intended function, such as racing or breeding. There are several kinds of insurance and majority of the insurance cover the Veterinary Fees.

Bloodstock insurance is essential for anyone involved in the ownership, breeding, or training of valuable horses. It provides financial protection against unforeseen events that could result in significant losses. The cost of Bloodstock insurance will vary depending on the value of the horse, its age, health, and intended use, as well as the specific coverage chosen.

- Q. What is your job title?
- A. Managing Director of the Bloodstock and Equine Division at Gallagher
- Q. What did you study at school/university/college?
- **A.** Left school with 2 A Levels and did not go to University but spent a year bringing on young event horses before doing a secretarial course
- Q. One of the most enjoyable parts of your role
- **A.** The different people I meet across the world whose business or pleasure is owning horses.
- Q. An aspect of your role people would find surprising
- **A.** How the insurance industry actually works as a whole for example, the company you place your horse insurance with is not the company that ultimately pays the claim.
- Q. Short description of your job role
- **A.** Advising on and then placing the insurance of high value sports horses and thoroughbreds stallions, mares, youngstock and racehorses. This can range from a single animal to complex schedules





Pony Racing and Flexible Learning Instructor, British Racing School (BRS) - Jackie Gill

The British Racing School (BRS) is a dedicated training centre set on a 120-acre site on the outskirts of Newmarket. The British Racing School offers a wide range of courses for jockeys, trainers, exercise riders, and racing secretaries and is dedicated to preparing the students for successful careers in the racing industry. The programmes cover everything from horsemanship to racing administration, taught by expert professionals passionate about the industry.

Horse welfare is a top priority of the BRS they teach students how to look after horses to a 'gold standard' in order for them to be able to work at the high levels expected by the racing industry. The horses are groomed and exercised daily by the students to promote good health and are course checked by instructors daily to ensure trainees have not missed any subtle signs if the horses are not at their best. The horses also have regular holidays as they turn out in herds for a well-deserved break and time to interact with other horses, which is vital for their mental wellbeing.

Each horse is assessed regularly and given a grade, with 1 being the easiest and 5 the most difficult; this enables instructors to give students horses of a suitable level to keep them safe but to also suitably challenge as their course progresses.

Q & A's Jackie Gill

- Q. What is your job title?
- **A.** Pony Racing and Flexible Learning Instructor.
- Q. What did you study at school/university/college?
- **A.** I left school at 16 after completing my GCSE's where I gained my qualifications in Math's, English, Art and Geography. Went to the Racing School when it was at Goodwood for a 6 weeks course.
- Q. One of the most enjoyable parts of your role
- **A.** Watching the students progress is the most enjoyable part, but also when students really try and if something doesn't work instantly, try again.
- Q. An aspect of your role people would find surprising
- **A.** Along with teaching the students, I also train the racing ponies here at the school to race.
- Q. Short description of your job role
- **A.** I teach children from the age of 8 to 16yrs to ride and be safe in pony races through training days, camps and visiting pony clubs with our mobile simulator.
- I teach students between the ages of 14 and 16yrs once a week where they will study and ride for their Level 1 Diploma in Equine studies before entering into the workplace, where they will then join an apprenticeship to work towards their Level 2 Diploma in Equine studies.
- I assess candidates portfolios for Level 3 Diploma in Equine studies who wish to go and gain their Racehorse Trainers Licence.
